There is that indescribable, mysterious feeling one gets while driving their MG on a beautiful day, with their favorite music in the background, driving down an open road that makes it all worthwhile and so enjoyable.

This fun weekend began about 9:30am at Cosmo's Diner on Portsmouth Blvd. Dan led us over back roads, on detours and over mountains. We lunched in Maidens, Va, at their famous (and only) sub shop, located on a back road no one could find unless you're lost. We ate outside next to a sign, "Maiden's Adventure" and some offered thoughts on what was at the end of this private road. Olive took a liking to the RR ties stacked nearby and tried to enlist help in taking some home. For dessert we peeked in the country store next door.

First tour stop was Walton's Mountain, childhood home of Earl Hamner, author of the TV series, "The Waltons", based on "The Homecoming". We toured the old school-turned-museum and visited rooms designed and furnished after the Walton's TV set farmhouse and learned everything there was to know about Earl Hamner and the famous series. The P. Buckley Moss museum in Waynesboro was the next stop. This large, beautiful building on a serene hill exhibits the original works of Pat Moss, one of America's most recognized artists. The Valley scenery and the Amish and Mennonite peoples of the area are the inspiration for most of her works. A large, ceiling-high doll house intricately furnished is displayed on the lower level, along with the museum store selling her prints.

We arrived at our motel, "Best Western Hunt Ridge", located just up the road from the equestrian center so everything in sight resembled horses. Barry and the Earlys met us at the motel. (They left after us but got there first!) A quick check-in and stop at Golden Corral was all the time we had before going to Hull's Drive In Movie Theater—with a double feature of "Monsters, Inc" and "The Count of Monte Cristo"--a long night bringing back memories of earlier days. As the evening progressed, one by one we heard the unmistakable sound of MG motors starting as the long day finally caught up with us all.

Saturday morning started the REAL adventures on REAL back roads. The Groovers and Watsons went exploring on their own. Early in our drive we all stopped and backed up as we spied an old restored grist mill. At Wade's Mill, Jim Young had been doing some work on the mill stream so no water had been in the race for awhile. Up on the platform by the mill wheel, we witnessed water arriving from the pond on the hill. He let the race fill before opening the gate




