

Tire Age John Procida (TTR)

In researching tire information on my RV, I realized that my RV tire concerns also very much apply to the tires of our British cars. Most of us (except for Ed Smith's daily diver TR7) probably have tires on our British cars that have plenty of beefy tread on tires that are 5 or more years old. The unseen danger is the AGE of the tire. After the tire is put in use the aging process continually reduces the strength of the tire. Here is some of the information that I've found in my research that I thought might well be shared with our club members. Most of it is common sense, so much so that we most times don't think of it. So for those who are aware of the tire aging this article is a reminder and for the others this a topic for serious thought.

Most industry experts would agree that the failure rate of tires goes up as they get older, but where do you draw the τ

line? It seems that 5 years is a good line for replacement and 7 years may be too dangerous. This could be affected up or down by mileage and how the vehicle has been stored and used. The danger, of course, is that the tire will fail by blowing out or throwing a good chunk of rubber while on the road. On the highway or in tight traffic this could be extremely dangerous for the vehicle and its occupants!

Is that from date of manufacture or from when they were put in service? The time in service seems to be the main consideration, but time from the date of manufacture is more reliable. If a tire was properly stored in a warehouse that should have a very small affect on the deterioration process. Heat, road forces and exposure to ultra-violet rays seem to be the main factors causing the degradation of the tire casing, but don't assume an un-mounted or unused old tire is safe. A club member recently wanted to install a set of original "Red Lines" on his TR to make it more original looking. That's Ok for the show – put them on at the show AND take them off after the show. Do not trust them for the trip home. That TR won't look very original if it's all bent up. You won't look very original if you're all bent up. So give serious thought to this topic and the information below can help find the tire age quickly. If you don't find the DOT line of information, look on the other side of the tire – it has to be there by federal law. You may skip the manufacturing plant info and the "other" information, just look for the line that starts with "DOT" and ends with a 3 or 4 digit number depending on tire age. The last numbers tell you the tires date of manufacture.

A tire's date of manufacture can be determined from the "DOT" number that is on the sidewall of every tire sold in the US.

A typical Pre -1999 DOT number GJHV234319: GJ= Manufacturing plant code HV234= other production information **319**= date code 31st week of 1999 (9=1999)

A typical 2000 up DOT number BTFR872001: BT= Manufacturing plant code FR87= other production information **2001** = 20th week of 2001 (01= 2001)

<u>One final note</u>. When I bought my GMC motor home I was quite pleased because the beefy Michelins seemed almost new – both by tire appearance and date code. After the third blow out (some on the highway) I realized the date code didn't specify the DECADE the tire was made. It seems that what I thought were 2 year old tires were really 12 year old tires. So if your tire code is 3 digits instead of 4, realize that you may be off by 10 years... or twenty... or...?
