

That, and I was trying to convince myself to do things right and not just try and find some other garage to give me a "wink and a nod". Using one of the 10% off/free shipping coupons from MOSS Motors you get at the car shows, I ordered most of the little bits and pieces needed to put it back together. What I couldn't get from the 2 major suppliers, I got from our own local "Uncle Vince's Gently Used MG Parts Emporium" at a very reasonable price. By mid December, I had all the necessary parts, and was ready to tackle the job.

I spent a Saturday morning removing the Weber carb, intake manifold, and the exhaust system. In the afternoon, on went the original combination intake/exhaust manifold, heat shield, Zenith carb, air pump, air manifold pipe, and gulp valve. By Sunday afternoon, it was time to try and start it. Or should I say fire it up, knowing the propensity for the Zenith-Stromberg carb to leak fuel. After sitting for at least 3 weeks, the car started up after 2 cranks. After some adjusting and fiddling, it wasn't running too bad, although a little too rich. Some more "fine tuning" got it to the point that I was ready to back it out of the driveway and take it around the block for a spin. It seemed to run ok, although still too rich, and seemed to have as much or even more power than before. I was pleasantly surprised, to say the least!

Terry's motion to have a booth at the AACA event was seconded and passed. Drag out those old parts you don't need anymore and get down there.


Marque Time:


