



At lunch time there was a wonderful show of radio-controlled aircraft skill on the front straight. Three prop-driven planes and two actual jet aircraft in miniature wowed the crowd. These scale model aircraft have a 3-4 foot wingspan and weigh about 30-35 lbs. The prop planes maneuvered in more complex ways than the real McCoy and could hover in a vertical position. The jet aircraft were extremely fast (top speed over 230 mph I was told) and went straight up with ease. I asked, "What is the range of that little jet?" "As far as I can see," was the response, until the fellow next to him said with a laugh, "sometimes a little farther than we can see!" It was quite a show.

One of the highlights of the afternoon for me being joined by a high school friend I had not seen for years and then seeing my buds at Abacus take over first place in their race, driving a 1965 Lola. We maintained a good caravan through the night back to Hampton Roads and texted an "all is well" message to end a thoroughly enjoyable weekend of driving and racing and camaraderie.
