Nine MGBs were in attendance (including the Villers' machine), plus a wayward TR-6 owned by Mike Jones. (Mike is a former member who has rejoined the fold with an MGA coupe that is almost ready to attend a meeting.)

Minutes from last month were approved by acclaim. The Vice Presidential Report was delivered with a convincing shrug by Steve LaPaugh, followed by Jim Villers' Treasurer's Report. We are in the black to the tune of \$886.88. (With lots of membership renewals in hand, that total will grow quickly.)

Activities: Tad Carter regaled the group with his account of coming attractions. The August meeting will return to Great Neck Park, with a picnic at 6:00 P.M. followed by the business portion of the program. Some of the scheduling highlights include the Hanover Tavern trip (August 12) and the New Kent County show on August 16. 

Report on the NAMGAR GT-37

Jennifer and I went to the NAMGAR (North American MGA Register) GT in Dayton, Ohio, during the second week of July, which is why we missed the meeting. The reservations had been made, the route was planned, and the MGA Coupe was prepped and ready to go; but the heat wave persisted. So, rather than face two somewhat uncomfortable 8-hour days in an MG, we took the Mercedes!

We still took our planned route and, for us, what a pleasant surprise Route 460 turned out to be – somewhat busy from Suffolk to Petersburg, but then miles of quiet, 4-lane, divided highway all the way to West Virginia. We stopped the first night in Christiansburg, Virginia, on Rt. 460 and then continued the next day with more of Rt. 460, then a few

miles of I-77 and I-64 through the mountains to Charleston, after which we turned onto Route 35 for pleasant drive Chillicothe, Ohio, for the second night. Route 35 was just like 460 – mile upon mile of quiet, 4-lane, divided highway.

Chillicothe had a very nice restored historic district so, with only 70 miles to go to Dayton, we decided to explore the town the next morning, the highlight of which was the Telephone Museum.

The Chillicothe Telephone Company was founded in 1880 and have stored away examples of their equipment over the years since. They even had a mural on the outside wall depicting their building in 1880. After exploring the museum and the town, we set off for Dayton and arrived about mid-day.




Already the host hotel was humming with MGs and their owners who, unlike us, had braved the heat of the journey. But, having travelled many miles in 100+ degree temperatures, we were glad we had not driven an MG. Who needs a 10 cent trophy, anyway? It really is the people who bring you back.

During the two events on Monday evening, the First Timers' Reception and the Orientation Pizza Reception, we were able to meet old friends and to make new friends while consuming adult beverages. This theme continued later in the evening in the Hospitality Room!


Tuesday dawned sunny and hot to provide opportunity for driving tours, tech sessions, a funkhana



and a Ladies' Progressive Tea. We decided to take a covered bridge driving tour which, with less than perfect directions, took much longer than anticipated. 

The covered bridges were quaint, but in between each we discovered that Ohio sure is flat, that they grow a lot of corn, and that it had not rained in quite a while! However, a visit to the hotel pool revived Jennifer's spirits and a Magnette tech session revived mine. A visit to the Hospitality Room later in the evening confirmed another per-





fect day of MGA fellowship and fun!

Unsurprisingly, Wednesday, the day of the car show, also dawned hot and sunny. The show was held at nearby Carillon Park, a venue that showed off the 150 MGAs and Magnettes to perfection. The park had plenty of shade, with some historic buildings that had been moved to the site, including a 1920s gas station and the Wright Brothers' Cycle Shop, to provide additional interest.



After the show, Jennifer retired to the pool and I went to the U.S. Air Force Museum. The museum was fantastic – three huge hangars packed with 100 years of aviation history. The hangars were so vast that a B-52, a B-1 and a B-2 occupied only a small corner! In three hours I managed to take quick look at all of the aircraft, but there were hundreds of side exhibits and an outdoor display that I had no time to examine.

In the evening there was a bar-b-que dinner at the "Taj Ma Garaj" – a unique "banquet" facility with an eclectic display of Porsches and VWs and politically incorrect murals. The evening was, of course, rounded off with a visit to the Hospitality Room. Thursday, the day of the rally and the awards banquet, again dawned hot and sunny. TMGC TECH TIPS 1969 MGC GT with A/C

Well, after a few months in a very hot garage, we have completed the installation of a Retoair (Retroair.com) MGB A/C system into my MGC GT. A few of the parts in the kit had to be altered because of the different engine size and radiator configuration, but it is in there.



The kit looks like it would bolt right into a later model MGB. We had to get a few hoses made at Hydra Hose, but they can make just about anything there in the way of hoses.

The evaporator installation into the interior required only a few adjustments since the MGB and MGC dashes are virtually the same.

The under glove box panel that came with the kit would not fit under my metal dash, so we fabricated one out of aluminum and padded it covered with vinyl to match the dash.


