I have "surround sound" in the family room, and now we can claim "Surround the Sound" in the MG world as well.

Celebrating the 50th anniversary of the MGB included a neat driving event on September 23rd. Tad Carter had laid out a back -roads run down to Manteo for us.



We 12 MGs met at the start in southern Chesapeake. We departed right on schedule and meandered over some routes that paralleled route 17 South. Tad had given everyone a neat fill-in-the-blanks "treasure hunt" David Kinsey had devised to keep navigators occupied along the way. As we passed through the Dismal Swamp and on towards Hertford, North Carolina, we began filling in the blanks as we spotted signs and landmarks along the way.

Some stuff you just had to know – for example, did you realize September 23d is also the birthday of Bruce Springsteen, Ray Charles and Augustus Caesar? We just happened to know that Ray Charles shared this date in history as we were in Georgia in 2010 and had the chance to see his birthplace.





Chesapeake has a lot of great back roads, but soon we were in North Carolina looking for more clues and history. At the western end of the Albemarle Sound we crossed the Haughton Road bridge and by lunchtime we were in Manteo. The greatly diminished tourist traffic was a bonus!



Our designated lunch-stop was the Full Moon Café and brewery. The menu was awesome, but Susan and I elected to maintain the British theme and went with Fish and Chips. Full Moon produces their own beer, and that's the only place you



can enjoy it. Susan had a taste-test of several great samples, and I elected a pint of Gaelic Ale. Gotta keep the theme!

After lunch we ventured over to Roanoke Island Festival Park. It was a pleasant day, and there was plenty to see and learn. We enjoyed the replica early sailing ship, Elizabeth II, and a walk through the village where re-enactors were plying their trades – blacksmithing, woodworking, etc. They were in costume and character as they explained a lot of history to us.



Of particular note was the Scottish blacksmith. He spoke is broad Scots brogue but was slightly taken aback when I responded in his native slang telling him it would likely be "...a bra bricht moonlit nicht a nicht." (loosely translated – a nice moonlight night tonight). We told a few stories, reminisced about our time living in Scotland (near where he was from), and finished agreeing that we both well deserved a wee dram later in the evening.

The group elected to spend their time there enjoying the museum and history of Roanoke Island so there were no takers for the oft-visited Wright Brothers Memorial. Crossing the sound on highway 64, we motored on in haste up the Outer Banks and over the Wright Memorial Bridge to Currituck to catch the last Ferry to Knotts Island. With an eye on the stop-watch, Tad led the group north. We had to catch the last ferry at 4:00 pm.

Oooops- Susan and I had forgotten to top off the tank, so a quick detour into a petrol station was in order. We were back on the road as fast as our Indy-500 pit stop would permit, but still well behind the group headed to the deadline for ferry departure.

Thanks to skilled handling, a finely tuned motor, and a good tailwind, (and expert navigating I also must mention) we were the last car boarding the ferry at the appointed departure time just as the gates were closing. 


TMGC January Meeting Minutes by Michele Peters (Photos by Donald Ladd and Susan Bond)


