TMGC Fall Tech Session—November 20

Veterans Day dawned clear and cool at the Bond Compound in Chesapeake, VA. By 10 a.m. a few projects were already underway: John Terschak was busy at the bead blaster as he fabricated inner splash panels for installation on his 1979 MGB. David Kinsey was under the trees, raising his 1980 B onto 6x6 wooden blocks in order to facilitate the draining of his cooling system.



This was in preparation for removal and replacement of the heater control valve, which had recently developed a pesky leak. (David reported that coolant dripping onto one's distributor is not good when you're stuck in traffic!) Inside one bay of Terry & Sue's spacious garage/automobilia museum I saw Pete Olson preparing to troubleshoot a list of electrical gremlins inside his 1976 B.



Soon, the grounds were filled with no fewer than 18 visiting MGs, including Frank Linse's 1958 MGA coupe and Craig Cummings' 1969 MGC-GT with its slick A/C installation. An added bonus was the appearance of Dan Ciccone's beautiful 1937 Packard Super 8 Sedan. (Dan is a good friend of the Bonds through the Tidewater Region chapter of the AACA.) One particularly unique MGB that showed up was sporting a Nissan DOHC/intercooled powerplant. It sounded like a small jet fighter when it departed later in the day.



Other tech session projects included: Andy Wallach and son Josh, who successfully traced out an intermittent turn signal fault and adjusted a door latch on their Dove Grey 1954 TF; Bruce Easley, searching for a rear axle drain plug removal tool, and a partial rebuild of Michelle Peters' distributor courtesy of Frank Linse. I was also able to install a dual strut bonnet lift kit on my 1974 ½ B-GT with the help of Don Ladd. (This is sold under Moss part # 900-072 and I recommend it. The security of the bonnet is improved, plus the



open position gives much better engine compartment access.)

Susan provided a sumptuous lunch for all hands, featuring some awesome chili and an extensive selection of malt beverages. She even managed to bleed the clutch on her B-GT to the delight of many onlookers. By the end of the day Pete Olson had fixed his running lights and flashers, along with his sound system – take THAT, Lucas!

Attendance was strong. In addition to those mentioned above, I spotted Stephen Daniel, Roy Gavilan, Jim Villers, Russ Ripp (and Buddy), Bob Ross, Tommy Keiningham, Mike Haag, and Steve & Mitzi Lapaugh, among others.
