June 15th Tall Ships Tour

If you want to plan a party or an event, first go to the Event Meister, Tad Carter, for a prediction for weather and opportunities for entertainment. Here in Hampton Roads over the past few weeks we've had Tropical Storm Andrea, cold fronts with 70 mph winds and heavy rain, blazing heat, and




temperature drops of 20 degrees in an hour.

BUT... Tad had wisely scheduled the Cape Charles Tall Ships MG Tour for a perfect day. Sunny, 80's, and light winds – a great day to put the top down.

The group of drivers met in Virginia Beach near the entrance to the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel. As usual, itineraries were provided, plus a Bingo card for people to match up with special scenes or items along the route. The group of 11 MGs made the scenic drive across the CBBT and up a winding Virginia Byway to Eastville. The fact that the Eastern Shore actually has hills and valleys is a well-kept secret, but they are there and we drove them.

In Eastville, we toured the old courthouse, the clerk's office and the debtors prison. The bronze bell used to call court to order is still there outside the courthouse. The Historic Eastville

Inn and the Master Gardener demonstration project are right next door as well.

After some time to soak up the history in Eastville, we were rounded up and headed out to the town of Cape Charles. On the way to the tall ships festival, we made a brief stop at the Cape Charles Museum. The building was built over and around a huge one-megawatt diesel generator that was used to provide power to the town during periods of peak demand during the town's early years. The building was replete with memorabilia and historical information regarding Cape Charles and the development of the Eastern Shore.

Next stop the Tall Ships Festival. This town was hoppin'! Booths and tents of food, drink, nautical items for sale, music, bars and "the whole ball of tar (wax)" were there, and pirates and wenches were everywhere! The docks had a number of nice boats to view.

The star attractions were the sailing vessel "Yorktown", the galleon "Chesterton Suliana", and the sailing vessel "Virginia". This last one is a gaff rigged two masted vessel that was built to the original drawing specifications to the Pilot Boat that plied the Chesapeake Bay waters in the 20's.


