### Whatever Lola Want, Lola Get...

I have an MG and now I have a "new" Lola! Both are British classics; both 1980 models; both 4 cylinder cast iron engines; both have Weber downdraft carburetors; both manufacturers went out of business as British car makers. I would like to say I mushed 'em together – as MG and Lola did once or twice.

But, that's not the case. I have not deserted my "Runaway" MGB, far from it, she's a keeper, but most of my car time (a LOT of time) has recently been spend on a British beauty of the same 1980 vintage:

It's been a long, long time since I was 14 and had a go-kart but the urge to drive really fast as if I were racing never left me.

Now I have that chance, thanks to a military retirement and only being relatively foolish with money in the last 4+ decades since piloting the go-kart (illegally) around the neighborhood.

The race car pictured is a Lola T-540E Formula Ford. These are powered by a Ford 1600 engine, originally of British genes (Cortina/Fiesta), but also used in the Pinto and

American version of the Fiesta.

The "formula" is a specification that describes particular characteristics of any Formula race car. In this case, the Ford 1600, Weber 32/36 carb, alloy wheels for '73-'81 (steel for the '68-'72), exposed shock absorbers, Hewland 4-speed gearbox, and many other aspects. A Formula Vee has specs, all the way up to a Formula 1. Race technical inspection is checking to see if you are true to the formula AND safe.

To drive one of these on a race track with other race cars takes a license...and a license typically takes formal training with a bonafide race driving school – in my case the Bertil Roos Racing School at Virginia International Raceway.

Several TMGC members have been racers and a couple still are, and I know they fully grasp the, "and then you need one of these, and then one of these, and two of those, and..." aspect of racing. A trailer had to be selected and outfitted, racing suit purchased, helmet, gloves, shoes, Nomex underwear....the list goes on. However, I'm planning on a decade of fun (or more) so I accepted the cost, but I shopped really hard and got some bargains. I will say the Formula Ford, in particular the Vintage/ Club level FFs are about the most economical way to get into racing. If you've hung out at race tracks you will soon see how

much more cost, trouble, maintenance, weight and manpower there is in racing an MG rather than a Formula Ford.

With HUGE thanks to the great guys at Abacus Racing here in Va Beach (here's the dyno test at Abacus: http://youtu.be/32mqyreYPHs), as well as the Apex Speed Forum online, and several FF racers who took time to explain the cars and show me the ropes, and to Tad for his help, I'm just about ready to race. It took a good while to learn the car, solve some issues, and basically make it MY car. Here's a link to a few test laps at New Jersey Motorsports Park in July: http://youtu.be/zSViJR36j7s

To the racers, yes I was taking it easy on my first time out. I saw no reason for high-risk spins on day one! Lots to learn

and plenty of time to learn it. For the curious, even though it looks kinda slow on video, I was going about 120mph at the end of the straight when I hit the brakes to turn right, then about 80 at the next turn, and about 100 prior to the LH turn after the bridge, so I was movin' along.

was movin' along. There is certainly more speed and ability in the car than in the driver at this point!

My first actual race will be the Heacock Gold Classic races at VIR at the end of September, which is unfortunately the same weekend as a couple of other club activities, but if you happen to be going, please stop and see me in the paddock. And, although most folks take a break for food or bathroom when the Formula Fords take to the track, maybe you'll stick it out and watch for a couple of laps? http://virnow.com/about-vir/

I picked #55 because there are only a few, two-digit race numbers not already spoken for within one vintage racing sanctioning body and the serial number of my chassis is #55 and that number was available. Turns out, I found a photo of the very first T-540E, s/n HU-1, and it also used race number 55! Cool. Done.

I know many of you enjoy going to vintage races and Tad asked if I would coordinate a trip to the Watkins Glen Vintage Grand Prix next year if a group wanted to go. Of course! Happy to coordinate a trip and let folks know the best places to stay, eat, watch, hang out..... but, when the flag drops, I hope to be racing!


