
Presidential Candidate, begging for your vote!

Convoy Etiquette (Helpful hints from an experienced convoy guide....)

Over the last few years, there have been several conversations about tips for traveling as part of a convoy. As we begin traveling again as a group, whether to shows or on our club tours, I offer for your consideration the following tips for travelers. These suggestions are amassed from the collective wisdom of multiple car clubs, as well as TMGC members, with the intent of improving the travel experience for all. Thank you to all who have offered their suggestions.

Prior to and at the Start:

(To the Organizer)

- 1) Advise prospective attendees of the date, time, gathering point, destination and potential costs of the event.
- 2) Prepare route information to distribute among the participants. ETAs for each stop along the way can help participants gauge their fuel and rest-stop needs.
- 3) Provide contact information for the lead car, other participants and destination addresses, as possible.
- 4) Have your phone charged and ready (with ringer set on loud) and accessible. Pre-program with contact information for participants, especially the Sweeper car, and the destinations (in case you need to alter arrival times).
- 5) A GPS other than your smart phone is advised. That leaves the phone available for other uses.
- 6) If possible, let the business owner at the starting point know that you will be meeting there and see if there is a convenient place to assemble without disrupting their business.
- 7) The starting line is the easiest place to lose someone, which can set off a chain of events that can spoil the day.

(To the participants)

- 1) Let the event organizer know if you plan to join in the drive. This allows you to be included in emails with any special instructions or late changes, and lets the organizer delay a planned departure for late arrivals (if possible).
- 2) If your plans change, let the organizer know so that reservations can be changed and the drive is not delayed waiting for a no-show.
- 3) If you are delayed, let the organizer know so that a start can be delayed or other routing can be arranged.
- 4) Prepare your vehicle for the intended travel, checking fluids, tires, and general road-worthiness.
- 5) Show up with a full tank and an empty bladder.
- 6) Have your phone charged, ready (with ringer set on loud) and accessible. Pre-program with lead car contact information.

On the Road:

(To the Lead Car)

- 1) Maintain a safe and proper speed. This is not a race.
- 2) Unless necessary, keep in the right lane, allowing faster vehicles to pass safely.
- 3) Use turn signals early. This is especially true with lane changes and left exits. Lane changes are not always easy and a 12-15 car convoy can stretch ½ mile or more.
- 4) When approaching a traffic light, SLOW DOWN and close up the convoy. If we get caught by the light, as least most of us will be together.

- 5) Keep an eye on the road ahead and the car immediately following you. Your travel companions will let you know if there is trouble beyond that.
- 6) If a vehicle has trouble, they will pull off the road when possible to make necessary repairs. You, on the other hand, are responsible for the safety of every other vehicle. If you must stop, get all who follow you to a spot where they can get safely off the roadway. A pack of cars along a highway shoulder is an added danger and creates a difficult situation for merging back on the roadway once repairs are complete. Obviously, this is just a guideline. Travel with the safety of the group in mind.
- 7) When pulling into a parking area, pull in as far as you can before parking. If you stop at the first spot and then back your car in, it takes lots of time and the tail end of the convoy is still in the roadway with traffic.
- 8) Know your Sweeper car.

(To the participants)

- 1) Keep pace with the vehicle ahead of you, while maintaining a safe interval between cars. As we will be traveling in the right lane, modern iron may need to merge onto or exit from the road (highway). The same holds true for 2-lane roads, allowing faster vehicles an opportunity to pass safely.
- 2) Lights on. This lets other vehicles (including your travel companions) know you are part of the convoy.
- 3) Maintain your position in line, if possible. If you like being up front, start up front. If you prefer being toward the back of the line, hold back as other vehicles depart. If you don't want to drive behind Robert, I understand.
- 4) Use turn signals early. This is especially true with lane changes and left exits.
- 5) When approaching traffic lights, SPEED UP. Close up the convoy. We want to maximize our chances of getting through the light together.
- 6) When a light changes to green, be ready to go. Maybe everyone can get through in one cycle.
- 7) You are responsible for the car immediately behind you. At a turn or a light, make sure they stay with you. If they fall back, slow down and let them catch up. They, in turn are responsible for the car behind them.
- 8) Be ready for a call from the lead car. You may be asked to lead the chase pack to catch back up to the peloton (sorry Tour de France is on).
- 9) If you pull over show thumbs up if you don't need help, thumbs down if you want us to stop. If this doesn't happen where all the cars can pull over safely, all but one or 2 can motor on to a safe place and pull over. Keep the leader informed.

(To everyone)

- 1) Have Fun!
- 2) Safety First and Safety Fast!

There are plenty of other articles discussing what parts and supplies to carry on the road. We'll save that for another time.

Cars & Types: 176 of the following types of MGs:


