Activities – January 2016

Well that certainly wasn't in the plans. For those of you who missed the Holiday Lights Drive, you also missed the Grimes Ave crime scene, which added emergency lights and TV cameras to the decorative lights in the neighborhood. I'm relieved there was a quick exit opportunity and that the rest of the drive was uneventful. What a beautiful night for a drive under clear skies, a sliver moon, and great temperatures for mid-December. Although we had a smaller crowd than usual, it was nice to see some members we have not seen in a while and to welcome Jayne's mom back to Tidewater for the winter. And once again, happy birthday to Jim.

We wrapped up 2015 with a total of 15 events, including 3 Tech Sessions, Moss Fest, and longer drives to Lynchburg and VA Wine Tour XIII. We were joined by 56 different families and 288 people. A single individual traveling to each event would have covered 2407 miles, and as a group, we covered 51,477 people-miles during the year. Our most active travelers for the year included Mark and Kathy at 3618 people-miles, and Donald and Rose at 3661 people-miles. And our really active travelers — our Traveler Award winners - were Terry and Sue at 3715 people-miles. Consider getting in your car in Virginia Beach, driving to Chicago and picking up Route 66 at the eastern terminus at Jackson and Lake Shore Drive. Take Route 66 to the Pacific Coast Highway in Santa Monica, CA and follow Highway 101 up the coast to the Monterey Peninsula. That is 3715 real miles — wow!

I was reminded that I never announced the winners of the 2015 Scavenger Hunt - you know, those pictures with the octagons at the designated GPS coordinates. While one might think I simply forgot (true), there is actually still time in 2015 for those who procrastinate. If you have pictures to share, I invite you to send them to me and we will announce our winners at the February meeting. And that will officially close the books on 2015.

Ready to start again? Happy New Year!!! Our first meeting of 2016 will be on Wednesday, January 6th at Frankie's Place for Ribs in Virginia Beach. This is always a great way to kick off the year. Good food, a large crowd, and an opportunity to mess up any dietary resolutions that may have survived the first 5 days of the year. Our hosts are expecting us anywhere from 6 to 6:30-ish – that's a new level of punctuality – and Robert will call the meeting to order somewhere around 7:30. I look forward to seeing you there.

Our first drive for 2016 will be on Sunday, February 14th – Valentine's Day! Our first stop will be the Jazz Brunch at The Table at Inner Banks in Edenton. Their farm-to-table menu will be served in the converted carriage house. From there, we head west to Scotland Neck and a guided tour at Sylvan Heights Bird Park. The water fowl should be in full plumage at this time of year, so it should be quite a show. Expect to do some walking. Park admission (including tour) is \$13 per person, \$11 for seniors (62+). Because of the holiday and the need to reserve both restaurant space and guides, you are asked to sign up for this trip by February 1st. Expect a 9:30am departure and a 6pm return to the Tidewater area. Est. 219 miles.

An email was sent in mid-December about the MG-2016 in Louisville, KY. Travel plans are taking shape, with outbound travel on 6/12-13 and return travel on 6/17-18. It looks like we may pick up a few travelers from the Central Virginia British Car Club as we head west, and possibly some from Shenandoah Valley further along the route. I have heard from several that are considering making the trip and will include them on details as they develop. Other than that, I'll try to avoid using precious Dipstick space on information that won't be pertinent to all. What I can offer is that if you are interested in attending MG-2016, you should consider registering for the event at www.MG-2016.com before hotel space is gone. And let me know if you want to be included in our travel plans.

One final note — I am honored to have received the beautiful Tidewater MG plaque at the Holiday Party. I have it hanging prominently in my office at home. I am happy to do what I do for the club and even happier that so many of you come along to share in the miles and the fun. Let's do it all again in 2016!

It was never scheduled, but there was a Tech Session in Newport News on Thanksgiving Day. It was hosted in a local parking lot, and the events unfolded as such....



MGB Engine/Trans Installation "Party"

Saturday, November 14, 2015 in Suffolk

I sent a short-notice (two weeks isn't that short, is it?) call to the club for volunteers willing to help install the engine and transmission in my 1973 MGB...or at least watch and learn...maybe just drink my beer, jeer and laugh. My main purpose was to have enough hands, wise and learned or not, to keep from scratching or denting the fresh "Black Tulip" paint job. This was my first time installing "the Lump" into an MGB. While I had successfully removed it alone, I knew that this is not "assembly is the reverse of disassembly". Pizza and beer were my only incentive, but I thought this was an opportunity for others to learn with me how this works, and I knew there would be challenges. There's always something...but we succeeded as a team!

I must thank the TMGC members who showed up. David Ford, Terry and Susan Bond (who drove their Bs to my house near downtown Suffolk) and Phillip Ford made it to my garage to help. They were probably a bit curious, since I have only attended tech sessions and they were wondering if all the pictures I brought were actually real since I joined the club 2 years ago. My friend and co-worker Eric Peterson with his son, Gregory, rounded out the party and they kindly made the pizza run. Eric and Gregory are potential LBC enthusiasts...I'm giving them doses of the LBCoolaid a sip at a time.

Some lessons on this procedure and some may only pertain to the '73 B - this was my first time, old hands probably know these things...especially the race guys who can do this in 45 minutes with their eyes closed whom I've met out at VIR, but they aren't worried about chipping the new paint either:

- 1. With a standard floor-rolling engine hoist, you must jack up the front of the car just an inch or two and put it on stands with the rear wheels chocked safely. The forward "legs" of the hoist won't fit under the front suspension "A-arms". Somehow when removing the engine/trans, the lift went under the carwithout raising it in front, but not on re-installation.
- 2. I thought three people would be fine to get this accomplished without dinging or scratching the new paint. Maybe it could work, but the best way is five people. One "foreman" to run the hoist and (eventually) the floor jack under the transmission; two to guide the engine from each side over the fenders and not banging the heater box; and two underneath to guide the transmission over the rear crossmember. Some might argue this, but they can't do it alone and still be smart MG guys with all their fingers and have it done in less time. A second "spotter" helps too, so make that six!




- 3. A "Leveler" is good money spent. It allows you to change the angle of the engine in degrees as you lower the "lump" into place. Just make sure you grease the thing so it doesn't bind up.
- 4. Make sure the two "lump guides" underneath understand that the rear of the transmission (the part that the driveshaft bolts to) goes <u>over and above</u> the fixed crossmember rear of where the yet-to-be-installed main transmission crossmember is.
- 5. Before starting the procedure, make sure everyone understands directional words, like "rear-forward-left-right" and what it means. "Fore" and "aft", to an Army guy (ahem) will cause confusion at the worst moment.
- 6. I protected the fenders with cheap \$3 Walmart fleece throws, under saved-up shipping wrap, and cardboard on top. Use masking tape to keep it in place.
- 7. Make sure you take pics of the transmission mount before you take it out. I didn't do enough. I meticulously photographed, bagged and labeled all the parts as I removed them, but I messed up on this part. The Moss diagrams only help a bit and the manual is useless on this issue because they changed through the years. Thankfully, we had Terry and Susan's awesome 1973 MGB GT for reference. We had fun going out to the street and crawling under the car to see what it's "supposed to be".
 - a. The John Twist video on transmission crossmemberis invaluable, but I hadn't committed it to memory. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=gUJE0AkWh1E
 - b. If John Twist is struggling to explain, you know it's going to be a challenge. We figured it out, eventually.
 - c. The round hole in the crossmember goes toward the rear! I think the later RBBs have an additional rod in there. Install the rubber mount center assembly to the cross member, not the transmission itself, before installation, then fit the whole thing up to the trans holes. Remember coarse threads for the bolts into the transmission housing and don't get them confused with all the other 5/16" bolts laying around!
- 8. A good tech tip (thanks Terry Bond), use some longer 5/16-24" bolts to hold the inner-frame "captive bolt plate" in place where the transmission cross member bolts to the frame.
- 9. Pizza and beer help keep everyone motivated for the final push. I should have set out some snacks. Water too. I must admit, I'm not a great host, and could have done better. My dogs, Summer and Sobe provided some greetings to the team as they went into the house. My lovely wife was going off to work.

My 48 year old body was sore the next day and I think I'm in pretty good shape. I think I should copyright "autoyoga". I did ding my bald noggin on the hoist jack as I was moving around as the "foreman". Good thing I was wearing a hat or it would have been bloody. Wear a hat and safety glasses!

I think we had a good time and learned some things together. I was happy to succeed in this milestone assembling my MGB. I'm now busy connecting all the parts and hope to get it running soon.
