MGA in the Barn

The term 'barn-find' is so overused these days it makes me cringe when I see it. However, when MGs are involved, it is always worth a look. So when Richard Hall called last month to let me know he'd been alerted to some 'barn find' MGs in Chesapeake, I had to take a look.

A good-sized group of TMGC members showed up for the excavation. There were four vehicles parked in three different buildings: A 1952 MG TD, a 1956 Ford Club Sedan, a 1958 MGA, and a 1974 Chevy Suburban. Both MGs were partially disassembled, with parts scattered not only through the storage buildings, but also in the house. Unfortunately, the owner had passed away more than a year earlier, and his daughter had no idea what parts were there or where they might be.

The MGA looked pretty decent under the grime and boxes. The hood was off, but present, and the engine bay looked complete. We couldn't get the engine to turn by hand, no surprise since it had been parked in 1985. However, one major discovery was a completely restored 1800 engine set up to go in the MGA, and part of the package. The body was solid and straight except for a rotten left rear fender dogleg, and I found a repaired fender hiding behind the Suburban. Searching the house turned up a new top and seat covers, which was enough to spur an offer. I ended up getting the car and all related MGA parts for \$3800!

I was back a week later for a second excavation. With Jack Pavlidis' help we used my truck to pull the MGA out of the barn, which was a lot easier than expected thanks to the tires holding air. Many more parts turned up, including a new carpet kit and steering wheel, three transmissions, rear axle, and a spare gas tank. Another friend from the antique car club arranged to have the MGA flat-bedded to my driveway, where it was waiting when we got home with the parts.

It took two weeks to sort and store the parts so I could actually get to the MGA. The initial impressions looked to be correct – the body is very straight, and the frame looks to be solid – even the battery boxes are good. I was going to try a wrench on the main engine pulley, but gave it one more try by hand now that I had better leverage – it turned! A new battery got the engine spinning well and 20+ pounds of oil pressure on the gauge. The plan was to do a compression test and maybe pull the head to see what shape the block was in. However, a very knowledgeable MG buddy pointed out that the carbs were new replacements – currently running more than \$1500 a set. It seemed unlikely anyone would put that kind of money into a bad engine. So I rigged up an external pump pulling from a gas can and tried to start the car. Nothing. Power to the coil and the points – but no spark at the points, which had understandably corroded a bit. A few swipes of emery paper resulted in a healthy spark, and three pulls of the starter knob later the MGA sputtered to life! No smoke, no drama – and within a minute the car was running smooth and strong with 60 pounds of oil pressure.

That happy surprise was followed by another – the hydraulics, both brakes and clutch, appear to be rebuilt and fully functional. It seems that the MGA was not as ignored as we had thought the past three decades . I found receipts and bags for some brake and clutch parts, and the drums look to be cleaned and painted. As might be expected, my timetable for getting the MGA on the road has undergone a major jump forward. I got a set of five new tires last week and have scheduled someoneto come look it over for a paint estimate. One thing for sure – I won't flinch the next time I hear the words 'Barn Find!' I'll have further reports as the MGA progresses.



Wine Tour XIV April 29 – May 1st, 2016

Wine Tour XIV began with an 8:03 a.m. departure from the Lake Wright hotel. 
