Terry and Sue's-Model T, GTO and MGB-GT were out front to greet each arrival. Coffee and donuts served as starters, which quickly gave way to cold adult beverages from the Bond's garage-based beer locker.

Terry offered personalized tours of the upstairs museum throughout the afternoon. This is an extra bonus feature of TMGC events at the Bond residence!

There was a bit of "technical work" going on at this session. Hank Giffin brought his recently-acquired 1971 B-GT for a few tweaks, including a balky driver's inside door lock that Frank Linse finessed into functionality. Hank also needed a boot lid adjustment, in order to prevent any more exhaust fumes entering from that direction. His tachometer wasn't registering, so much discussion followed about missing wires, etc. In the end, it appeared that he may not have the exact correct tach installed. In any case, the gauge itself may be in need of a rebuild.

Jim Villers had his MGB-GT V8 on display with bonnet and boot open for inspection. Everyone had fun getting a close look at the most impressive engine compartment! Jim's GPS speedometer was also a hit. The V8's exhaust note was appreciated when Jim headed out later in the day.

Tommy Keiningham had his 1973 MGB inside the garage for a look at the undercarriage. The slight lean to the left was not diagnosed completely, so he may be in for some adjustments down the road.

Fred McCall was troubleshooting his turnsignals which didn't seem to be flashing. The switch appeared to be functioning, as a click could be heard when it was operated. However, without any signs of life at any corner, he may need a new flasher. The modern replacement flashers don't seem to last very long.



Donald and Rose had their MGC-GT on hand, which pro-



They own and operate 14 safe houses for emergency shelter for individuals and families fleeing violence and those at risk of losing their homes.
