***** MG2022 Update - January 2022 - Happy New Year! *****

The organizing committee of MG2022 continues to work behind the scenes to ensure all our participants enjoy a memorable and fun-filled convention. Registration opened at the beginning of December and our team has been overwhelmed by the fantastic response we have seen thus far.

At the time of writing this update, we are down to our last 10 convention rate hotel rooms. All this allocation at the Holiday Inn has now sold out and the remaining rooms are at the Best Western. Standard rates at both of those hotels are still available by making your own arrangements directly with these host hotels themselves. Peterborough also offers several other choices for accommodations including hotels, motels, traditional bed & breakfast, AirBnB and some excellent campgrounds in the local area.

Our activities are also filling up fast. We kick things off on Sunday when registration opens at the Holiday Inn, followed by the NAMGBR Meet & Greet where you will be able to meet the organization's officers and registrars.

Monday will have a full schedule of programming including numerous Tech Sessions, Guided Tours, a Rallye and Funkhana during the day, followed in the evening by our Parking Lot Party at the Holiday Inn. We will also have self directed driving routes mapped out for those who wish to explore Peterborough and surrounding areas in their MG.

Tuesday brings us another full day of activities including the famous John Twist Rolling Tech Session plus more Indoor Tech Sessions, Guided Tours and the Hagerty Driving Experience followed in the evening by our Group Dinner at Lang Pioneer Village and then later by our Pub Night.

Wednesday is the day you have all been waiting for. The Car Show is the main feature of all NAMGBR conventions. We will have all the standard NAMGBR classes for MGB, MGC, Midget, 1100/1300 and Post Abingdon cars plus classes for MG T-Series, MGA, MG - Other and British - Other. *You do not need to bring a NAMGBR sanctioned car to participate in our car show and we encourage owners of all MGs to consider bringing their cars to MG2022.*

This year's show will take place at Nicholls Oval Park, only a short 5-minute drive from the host hotels. This was the site of the Car Show at the inaugural convention in 1992 and we look forward to making our return to this beautiful location and filling it with hundreds of MGs. There are washrooms on site, plus lots of trees for shade, a playground with splash pad for our youngest enthusiasts and a covered pavilion just in case of any inclement weather. We have lined up a DJ to play British Invasion tunes, some food trucks and British Car related vendors to offer a complete MG Car Show experience.

The Car Show is followed by the Awards Banquet at the Holiday Inn. Ticket holders will be provided with a hearty meal and once the dinner has finished, we will open the Awards Ceremony to all participants. Covid restrictions might make it a bit challenging to fit all participants into the banquet facility, but we are working on finding a way of having the ceremony broadcast on a live feed into one or two of the hotel's conference rooms. You will not want to miss our Guest Speaker coming all the way from the UK, Dr. Ian Pogson, who spent many years working on Post Abingdon cars for MG. His stories and tales from the modern factory are not to be missed.

Thursday morning, we say farewell with a Pancake Breakfast to promote MG2023 in Calgary. We look forward to hearing more about MG2023 from the Calgary MG Club. I have personally visited the host hotel for MG2023 and can say it will be a fantastic location for another NAMGBR convention.

Temperature Control for your LBC. ... or, all you need to know about antifreeze

So, how do you make your own anti-freeze? Hide her cardigan!

Sorry, it's an old British joke. Really though, this isn't a recipe for how to make your own anti-freeze, rather it's a sort of "primer" on the stuff to help you better understand what that strange smelling green stuff is all about. Apologies to any "chemists" in the group, but I've got to keep this simple so even the drive-way motor-head can follow along nicely.

So, is your MG ready for winter? It's already cold enough for me, and I'm sure your MG too.

Way up North (that's above the Mason Dixon Line) I've known people who have simply drained the liquids from their cooling system over the winter. Ok, it probably won't freeze, but is it the right thing to do?

Let's start from the beginning and sort this all out. There is still plenty of time left this season to rush right out and buy something that'll work to keep your car from freezing (aside from a heated garage).



ANTIFREEZE is an additive which lowers the freezing point of a water-based liquid. An antifreeze mixture is used to achieve what's known as "Freezing Point Depression" in cold environments. You just knew there had to be a fancy name for it right?

Common antifreezes also increase the boiling point of the liquid, allowing higher coolant temperature. However, all common antifreeze additives also have lower heat capacities than water, and do reduce water's ability to act as a coolant when added to it.

The purpose of antifreeze really is to prevent a rigid enclosure from bursting due to expansion when your coolant freezes. Commercially, both the *additive* (pure concentrate) and the *mixture* (diluted solution) are called antifreeze, depending on the context.

As a bonus, most if not all commercial antifreeze formulations intended for use in heat transfer applications include different kinds of anti-corrosion and anti-cavitation agents that protect internal components. Lubricants are also added to help keep your water pump turning smoothly. Down inside the radiator and engine itself there are of course some dissimilar metals, and anti-freeze is designed to help prevent galvanic reactions (that's the crud produced by corrosion when two dissimilar metals react)

In the history of the automobile, just water proved to be not such a great thing to have in an automobile during winter. Initially, Methyl Alcohol (Methanol) was added to lower freezing points. Ethylene Glycol soon replaced pure alcohol antifreezes as they raised

the boiling temperature of the coolant. Ethylene Glycol became commercially available in 1926 so it's been around a while – long enough that we've figured out it works well.

Propylene Glycol is much newer. It is used because it's less toxic and can be used around foods and wherever unwanted exposure to the toxicity of Ethylene Glycol needs to be avoided. But, since you don't regularly lick the radiator on your car, we'll move on.

So, what about those colors? Most antifreeze we'd put into our cars will be green. There are other colors that are used to differentiate between different types and uses. Prestone can be yellow for example.

That Orange stuff is called Dexcool. It was developed by General Motors. It was introduced in the 1990s. It's supposed to last 5 years or 150,000 miles, but there have been problems with it. Cooling systems that use Dexcool exhibit more acid buildup and rust in the system when the coolant level gets low and oxygen is allowed to enter the system. The acid eats away at head gaskets and intake gaskets. Rust builds up in the system, inhibiting coolant flow, which causes overheating.. Although GM stands behind it's usage in their vehicles, there have been several class-action law suits. I guess that's another reason not to put a small-block Chevy engine in an MG!

Ethylene Glycol and Dexcool do not play well together! Don't mix them, and if you've used that orange stuff before, don't just try to drain it out and replace with the green stuff. Traces will be nearly impossible to flush and the result will be formation of a jell-like substance. Best bet is to continue using what you are currently using.

Vehicle fluids have varied in color over the years, but today colors are used mainly to differentiate between brands.

Another nice thing about the colors – intended – is that leaks reveal themselves readily. If it looks like anti-freeze and smells like anti-freeze on your garage floor, it's a cooling system leak – not an oil leak! Of course if you have white foam in your coolant that does indicate the presence of oil in the cooling system, which requires more investigation to identify the cause. If your green stuff has turned brown, it might indicate that the rust inhibitors have broken down and it's time to drain and replace with fresh green stuff.

Mixing it up! The usual mix ratio of Ethylene Glycol and water is 1:1. That should produce a freeze point of around minus 34 degrees. I think that's safe enough in Tidewater! If your coolant level is a little low, yes you can top it up with anti-freeze rather than try to carefully mix a small amount.

How often do you change the stuff? Give it the look/smell test. Check specific gravity with one of those cheap plastic indicators that will give you a fairly accurate reading of the range of temperatures you are protected to. As a matter of course, most anti-freezes are supposed to be changed every two years. Some newer products recommend 100,000 mile intervals, and the best stuff Prestone makes is supposed to go three times that.

If you have any doubts about what you are doing, just read the label.

At the very least, check your radiator before it gets any colder to make sure you are protected. Remember this one basic tech tip – if it looks bad, it probably is. That includes radiator and heater hoses too.

Yes, alcohol is an anti-freeze. That's why a cold beer is still refreshing on a cold day. But, that (or good single malt Scotch) doesn't belong in your MG radiator.


