"Death by Chocolate" Weekend, Feb. 12-13 By Bruce and Jayne Easley

Who expects nice weather in mid-February when you plan in advance? Well our group of MGers sure got it for our planned weekend in Chincoteague and Wachapreague on the Eastern Shore. A Saturday with 70 degrees was perfect for strolling around Chincoteague and taking part in their annual "Death by Chocolate" scavenger hunt. Even a threatened forecast of rain and possible snow on Sunday did not deter us or come to pass. As one of our party said, "I didn't buy that MG just to look at it sitting in the garage... I'm gonna drive it!"



The group of 16 met and departed from the CBBT parking lot at oh-nine-hundred on Saturday, and stopped halfway to Chincoteague for a planned meetup with another "local" couple, before continuing on our mission to reach town and start "chocolating". On the approach to town we passed the NASA Wallop's Island facility with a huge solar farm and a wildlife refuge. We were able to park together in town close to the Main Street shops, and most of the group opted to start with lunch to beat the rush and to start filling out our scavenger hunt cards. Ironically we wound up at "Don's Seafood Restaurant/Chattie's Lounge" (Don is a famous member of our group), which advertised Dancing and a Raw Bar. We partook of no dancing, but enjoyed the meal. After lunch we set out on our own recognizance to seek out chocolate, card entries, and whatever was interesting. There were



a number of shops offering unique local items, some very good art (some better than others), decoy carvings, treats to eat, and other things. One disappointment was that the Black Narrows Brewing Company did not open until 4 PM. How could they do that on a special Holiday weekend? Of course it could be just as well we were prevented from sampling their signature IPA brew made from longleaf pine needles. Some of our group also visited the nearby Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge and took hikes on the local byways.

At 3 PM the group reconvened for our trip to Wachapreague to check in at the hotel and get ready for dinner. En route we took some back roads, and where some of the party may have thought we would have to do the muchderided U-turn at a Dead End sign, we motored through... to a stoplight where the U-turn actually took place. The Wachapreague Inn is a classic fisherman's hotel, with not too many amenities, but friendly staff, good vibes, a lot of character and... right across the street from our restaurant! Although we were a relatively large party, the Island House



Restaurant managed to seat us all together in a room with a view of the water. Their specialty is fresh seafood and they have plenty of choices, combinations and "turf" as well. Since we had taken up all the rooms in "The Big House" at the Inn, we were able to use the downstairs sitting room/kitchen area as our meeting place to gather, unwind, share a few more drinks of choice, and catch up with good friends and MG news before retiring to look forward to Sunday's back road tour.





Eastern Shore Excursion – Second Day

The weather turned from Saturday evening through early Sunday morning. Several members were up before 7 am, in time to enjoy coffee in the Big House meeting room. At 8 am the office was open, and assorted pastries were available as folks checked out. Motors were being tested and everyone's MG fired up nicely in the winter chill.

We departed sleepy Wachapreague at 0930 and headed south on Seaside Road. Mike and Jennifer led the way in their SUV. (Too bad the ZB Magnette couldn't make the trip!) Our seven-car convoy (including 5 of the remaining MGs) enjoyed a spirited trip down this historic route. Along the way we saw several examples of 18th and 19th century homes, sprinkled amongst the numerous Eastern Shore bungalows and farmsteads.

We continued through several small towns, including the outskirts of Willis Wharf. We arrived at our destination inside the Eastern Shore of Virginia National Fish and Wildlife Refuge and proceeded to tour Battery Winslow. This is a relic of the old Coast Artillery days, when huge guns guarded the approaches to Hampton Roads. We posed with the 16 inch gun barrel that was displayed under a huge concrete casemate installation. This particular barrel came off of the USS Missouri and was last fired in anger during the Korean War. We climbed the long stairway to the top of the casemate and enjoyed pristine views of the Fisherman's Island area, including the Cape Charles Lighthouse.

After saying our goodbyes we jumped onto nearby Route 13 and headed home. The CBBT leg was peaceful, with excellent visibility all the way to Virginia Beach. Thanks to Bruce & Jayne, along with Mike and Jennifer for doing the legwork to coordinate a most enjoyable mid-winter outing in our MGs. We only scratched the surface of what the Eastern Shore has to offer, which means that more roadtrips to this history-rich area are in the offing!







MG DOGGEREL



7:50 heard a motion to adjourn which was moved and seconded. I miss the gavel....




