

Fall Tour Friday 9/23. . (aka Delaware Drive)

The weather had cleared out overnight as we departed Georgetown, DE for Dover Air Force Base. Our target was the Air Mobility Command Museum, which is accessible from on off-base gate on a country lane. We cruised through soybeans, corn and even some hops as we made our way along relaxing secondary roads. High water caution signs guided us through the marshy terrain until we missed the gate and made our first (and highly-obligatory) U-turn of the trip. We parked as a group and leaned into a stiff breeze as we walked to the hangar.

Our assigned docent, Scott Kapes, USAF retired had flown several of the aircraft that we were about to see. His presentation was both witty and insightful – no bored tourists in our group! The museum had an excellent indoor display of Army Air Force equipment from the Second World War. This included authentic examples of Stearman and Vultee training aircraft, as well as a Douglas C-47 Dakota that delivered paratroops (twice in one day) to the D-Day skies over Normandy in 1944, TheC-47 interior tour was great fun for



everyone, especially PJ, our resident paratrooper! It's a steep walk uphill when you make your way to the cockpit in those taildragger airplanes.

Also on display was a B-17G Flying Fortress in all its glory, including original noseart. Our docent regaled us with tales of crewmembers who flew the Flying Forts against Nazi Germany in 1943-1945. The ball turret gunner display was astonishing – to see how a gunner had to squirm into that tiny compartment was an eye opener for us all.



Outside we saw a huge assortment of static display aircraft that covered the history of Army and Air Force transport, fighter, and attack planes from the 1940's through the present day. The tour included the interior of a C-130 cargo plane, which turned out to be one of PJ's former hangouts during his paratrooper days. We also toured a C-9 executive transport, which was used as Air Force Two for many years. The plush interior had hosted many Vice Presidents (and hangers on) over the years.

Departing the parking lot, we saw that another car club was visiting -- a good number of Shelby Cobras had lined up near our much more desirable LBCs. Our route continued to please with plenty of curves and limited traffic. Our luncheon stop was the historic Cantwell Tavern in beautiful Odessa, DE. The

Tavern dates from the early 19th Century, when Odessa was competing to be a major railway stop. The upstairs room was filled with period details and the menu was superb. (Personal opinion here – best crabcake EVER!)



After filling ourselves on good grub and a few refreshing beverages, it was off to the Nemours Estate in Wilmington, DE. Our group got a bit fragmented during the late stages of the drive (which included a bonus U-turn) but we all managed to reunite in the correct parking lot, which is adjacent to ahuge hospital complex adjoining the estate.

Much of the tour was self-guided, which was perfect for strolling through the huge grounds on a picture-perfect Fall day. The home is a stunning example of an American Gilded Age Country Estate. (Think of the Biltmore Mansion as a comparable property.)

The DuPont's brought everything imaginable from Europe in order to furnish their main home. 16th Century tapestries adorned many of the main floor walls, and paintings by many Masters could be enjoyed throughout the house. Of course, as an MG club we HAD to see the chauffer's garage in detail. Here we saw, among other classics, Mr. DuPont's 1960 Rolls Royce Phantom V. The late queen owned #1 of 10 ever produced. DuPont owned #2. Elton John had one as well.



Perhaps the most amazing feature of the Nemours

Estate is the surrounding gardens. Part of our group took advantage of a scheduled garden tour, which was tailor made for the Master Gardeners among us! The views of the estate were unforgettable – the sort of images you see in "Wedding Venues of the Rich and Famous."

Our next leg led us to the Holiday Inn Express just a few miles away. We gathered for some pre-supper refreshments before strolling just across the street to a TGI Friday's that was very happy to host a large party from out of town. Stomachs were filled once again as we closed out a thoroughly enjoyable day of driving, learning, and camaraderie.

Elizabeth City Drive-Out - October 22, 2022

Rob MacPherson organized our drive to Elizabeth City on Saturday, October 22, 1022 and it was a surprisingly interesting drive. Attending were Robert Perrone with Caroline Remeika, Jim Villers, Russ Ripp, Donald Ladd, Tom Keiningham, and Rob MacPherson. In Elizabeth City, we met up with Rich Lodge, a North Carolina member with a very attractive 1953 TD.



The Camden County Museum, a small county museum run by volunteers is what made this drive special. We were met by Alex Leary, the county Historian who showed us around the one room museum and jail. Alex was very knowledgeable, enthusiastic and wove the story of Camden County history into the frame-



work of the nation's history in an opinionated and captive way. We all learned something from him; that Abraham Lincoln being a somewhat wealthy railroad lawyer to President Polk expanded the country more that Thomas Jefferson (he added the Republic of Texas, the Oregon Territory and the Mexican Concession which included California).

After hearing the history, we toured the old jail. Again, something I have never seen before. The brick building was built in 1910 and on the second floor was a modular

four heavily bared, riveted steel cells of the jail manufactured by the Stewart Jail Company of Cincinnati, OH and assembled in place as the building was built.

After a short drive we arrived in Elizabeth City and the Museum of the Albemarle, our primary destination. This state sponsored museum also interpreted the local history of northeastern North Carolina but its exhibits were designed for elementary school tours. The exception was a nice "High on the Hog" exhibit tracing hog farming in North Carolina.

Every drive needs a good lunch stop and Hoppn' John's surpassed expectations.




Tech Stuff GPS Speedometer by Jim Villers

I have gotten spoiled by my constant use of digital speedometers in my modern cars and I am now accustomed to having an accurate digital speedometer in my MG.

Amazon of course is the source for my Acecar Digital GPS Speedometer; it cost only \$24 and was delivered the day after I ordered it. There many other GPS speedometer options available from Amazon and other suppliers but I chose this model because of its simple display and the goose-neck holder.



The unit receives 5V power from a USB plug. I used an adapter from my cigarette lighter which

The Speedometer comes with very obscure instructions which describe its options which can be accessed by pushing its "wave function" button on the top. The first adjustment is to set the displayed


speed adjustment. The default is 107 which displays a speed about 7% high (about 4 mph at 60 mph). I adjusted mine to 101 and it now matches my Garmin GPS. The other adjustments are "over speed alarm"; "fatigue

driver alarm"; brightness adjustment; and "decretive "e-lamp".

I used the suction cup holder to install my GPS Speedometer on my steering column. The suction cup of course would not stick to the plastic and I chose not to try the sticky



smooth thing that came in the box but I just taped it on with black electrical tape. It is centered behind the steering wheel so it appears to be in the center of the instrument cluster and is perfect for checking my speed.
