


Spaghetti Dinner






February Tech Session





Club members have caught the MG bug

They don't mind if other British sports car owners hang out with them.

But if you show up at one of the Tidewater MG Classics club parties in a Triumph or an Austin Healy, be prepared for abuse.

It's not personal. But nothing compares to owning an MG, club members say. And once the MG bug hits you, you're hooked.

"It's like eating potato chips – you can't stop at one," said Mike Ash, a club founder. He owns eight MGs. "It's the poor man's sports car ... they were always for the common man and still are."

Twenty years have passed since Ash and seven other men met in the Pembroke Mall parking lot to show off their MG (which stands for Morris Garages) cars. Back then the club was only for "T" series owners, but over the years the members decided to allow everyone who owned an MG to belong. In fact, the club's name used to be MG "T" Classics, but since the last of the "T" series rolled off the line in 1955, members figured there weren't enough of those owners around.

"It's a mutual support group," said Ash, a past president. "We want to preserve and maintain the car. They're very good handling cars and very good value."

More than 80 people in Hampton Roads agree with Ash enough to pay \$15 a year to belong to the club. Last Saturday night they and their guests celebrated the 20th anniversary of the club with a fancy dinner at the Shifting Sands club at the Fleet Combat Training Center at Dam Neck.

Members arrived in their gleaming MG roadsters, sedans and hardtops, of course, and admired each other's vehicles from the balcony of the Shifting Sands, which overlooks a long stretch of unspoiled beach.

carriages, and every owner remembers his or her first one. "I bought my 1958 Magnet sedan for \$3,000 in 1979," said member Robert Davis. "And I worked on it for seven years, putting in air conditioning, power disc brakes, overdrive.

"I've owned MGs for 99 percent of my adult life. I love the cars." Peggy Bradford, owns a 1952 MG TD in "British racing green" and says that owning an MG is like belonging to a clique.

MGs, especially the convertibles, look like the ultimate cruising cars with their sleek lines and low

"If you have an MG you're a friend," she said, "MG owners will honk and wave to each other on the road. I've put a little note on an MG in a parking lot if I see one."

More than 1 million MGs were made in Britain between 1936 and 1980, when the original manufacturer ceased production. (The "T" series stopped in 1955.) The series included the TA, TB, TC, TD, TF, B, and A and were very popular with American servicemen after World War II. Prices of the MGs when new ranged from \$1,800 to \$8,000; now a good one will cost between \$10,000 and \$20,000, according to Ash, but a restoration can cost anywhere from \$5,000 to \$30,000.

"It's an investment car," he said. 'They're harder to find now."

Ken Bingham, president of the club, said that most owners bought their cars in college and that the height of popularity for the cars was 1973.

"'Love Story' had one and anything on PBS will have an MG," he said. "You don't even need to own an MG to be in the club - just some interest."

The club meets monthly to socialize but members just don't stand around and talk about their cars. They have road rallies, chili cookoffs (in January) and summer pool parties, along with a yearly best-of-show contest for each series of cars. Sunday "tech sessions" help owners learn ways to restore their classic vehicles. Carol Bingham, Ken's wife, said that MG owners are "immediately friendly" with each other and that the cars are almost incidental.

"There is a real camaraderie when we get together and meet other people," she said. "Everyone's here because they love the cars ... it doesn't matter who you are or what you do - the common bond is the car."
